- Unit 4: Coursework – The origins of the Cold War (Year 13)

Year 12

Year 12 will be spent studying the theme of 'searching for rights and freedoms in the 20th century', analysing the History of the USA and Apartheid in South Africa.

You will examine different views and debates around these key issues as well as developing your ability to evaluate historical sources.

At the end of Year 12, all students will sit AS exams on USA, 1917-1996 and South Africa, 1948-94

Year 13

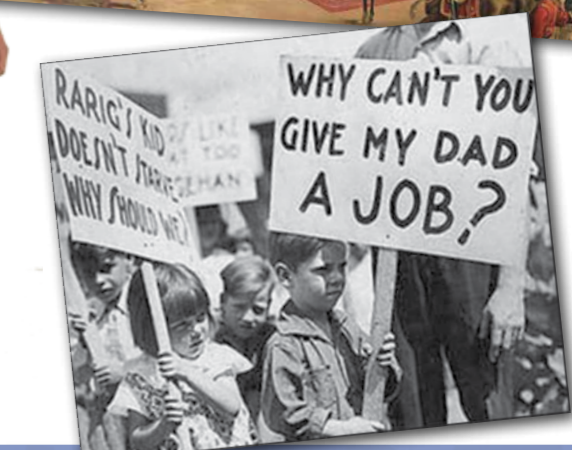
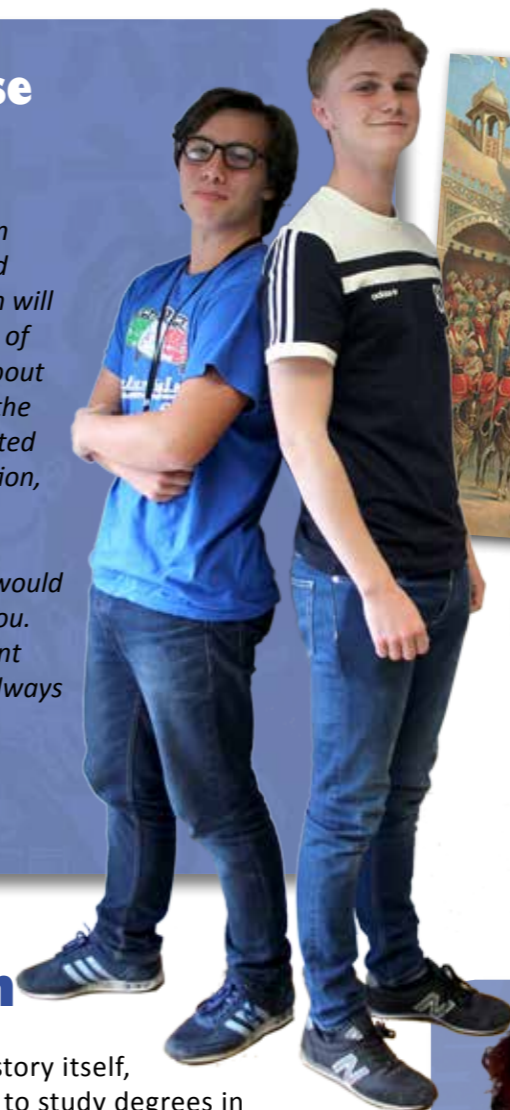
The introduction of coursework in Year 13 provides a fantastic opportunity to build your skills of independent research and enquiry, as well as preparing your for the important transition from A level to University study.
